COURSE DESCRIPTION

CAT 124GS is a 4-unit course designed to accompany students' participation in an internship in Dublin, Ireland. The course, taught remotely, provides students with an academic framework through which to analyze and leverage their international internship experience. Through weekly seminars and assignments students will share their reflections and observations about their internships while exploring what these experiences mean in the context of their own civic and professional development. Foregrounding the themes of critical inquiry and professional success students will produce documents that help to develop and illuminate their professional identity, values, and experiences. Fulfills the Sixth College Practicum requirement.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Through participation in this course, students will develop their ability to...

- Reflect critically on their own experiences, perspectives, and responsibilities in a global context
- Communicate with diverse and multicultural audiences
- Articulate their professional values and goals
- Understand and utilize best practices in professional development

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

1. Group Discussion Seminars/Sections
2. Weekly Assignments

**To pass the course, students must also submit a validation signed by their internship*

supervisor.

Group Discussion Sessions (40% of your grade)

Each week you will participate in ZOOM group discussion sessions with your cohort and course instructor. Come to each 90-minute discussion session prepared to discuss your experiences at your internship and your reflection assignments. To receive full credit you must have read the week's readings and prepared to have an engaged, interactive discussion with your fellow classmates. Your camera should also be on (if this is not comfortable or possible, please contact me before class).

Weekly Assignments (60% of your grade)

Each week you will complete a weekly assignment that will contribute to your professional development. You will be given prompts and resources to guide your assignments via the course website. Review your papers for grammatical/spelling errors/ typos before you submit them. Papers that contain many careless errors will be penalized. Assignments are due Sundays by 11:59pm.

Additionally, students must complete the following requirement:

Internship Validation

At the end of the course, you must submit an internship validation form signed by your supervisor and documenting the hours that you worked throughout the 8 week quarter. To pass the course, you must have worked all 8 weeks of the quarter AND worked a minimum total of 120 hours (an average of 15 hours/week). Failure to complete the minimum requirements will result in an automatic grade reduction to F/NP. If for any reason you find that you must miss more than the equivalent of one week's regular shift at your internship or if you must end your internship early, you MUST inform the instructor and your site supervisor immediately.

COURSE POLICIES

Attendance: Discussion seminars/sections are synchronous and you are expected to attend each via ZOOM. While attending, we ask for your undivided attention and that you are not using or looking at your phone, websites not related to the course, or other technology. You are also required to keep your video on (at all times) and your audio muted (unless you have a question). To ask a question or provide a comment, please use the “Raise Hand” function or use the chat feature. If you have any concern about upholding these requirements or would like to ask for an exception to these attendance policies, please talk to me as soon as possible.

Chat Rules: We will utilize the chat feature on ZOOM during section/seminars to facilitate discussion. You are also welcome to use the chat feature to make comments, ask questions, or provide insights that are relevant to the topic being discussed. Any harassing, derogatory, discriminator, or off-topic comments will not be tolerated (and will impact your final grade).

The Respect Rule: I ask you all to show the utmost respect to everyone in the classroom. We all have different backgrounds, values, beliefs, identities, and experiences that may sometimes cause disagreement; but when you are in this class, you are required to demonstrate understanding, respect, and empathy towards your fellow classmates, guest speakers, and instructors.

Office Hours Policy: I highly encourage you to take advantage of my office hours. My (virtual) door is always open and I am happy to talk to students about a range of topics, not just course-specific issues. I want to help make your experience during this global seminar is a positive one. If you cannot make my scheduled times, let me know, and we can make an individual appointment.

Late Work Policy: I will accept late work for one week (7 days). For each day it is late, we will

deduct 3% points. After a week, submissions will be accepted only on a case-by-case basis and, if accepted, will not receive higher than a 50%. If you are concerned you will miss a deadline, please contact me at least 48 hours before the assignment is due to work out a new deadline. (I will not give extensions retroactively).

Academic Honesty: All work for this course must be original and created by you. You may receive feedback from classmates or friends, but the writing you submit must reflect your own thinking, language abilities, and stylistic choices. **Use of generative AI is strictly forbidden. This includes AI-assisted writing, editing, ideation or brainstorming, and translation.**

If your native language is not English, it is forbidden to write your work in your native language and rely on Google Translate, Youdao, DeepL, or any other machine translator, including those that may use generative AI, to produce the English version you submit. This practice constitutes outsourcing your writing and violates the academic integrity expectations of the course. All assignments must be written directly by you in English.

Under UC San Diego's Academic Integrity Policy and Procedures, instructors are required to report all potential violations. As a result, any suspected use of generative AI or unauthorized translation, whether or not it can be definitively confirmed, will be reported by me to the Office of Academic Integrity for formal review. The Office of Academic Integrity, not the instructor, determines the outcome of that process. If you are unsure whether something may constitute an AI-related violation, you must ask me before submitting your assignment.

My office hours are always available for you, and I encourage you to meet with me to discuss ideas, brainstorm, get feedback, improve a draft, or talk through challenges in your writing. I am here to support your learning and help you grow as a thinker and communicator.
